



Foster Care & Adoption Network Why, Where & How We Do It?

Our policy

FCR is a no-kill animal welfare organization and our focus is on keeping the community's pets in the community, rather than removing and relocating them. Forty years of county/city pounds and traditional sheltering show us there will always be more strays to replace the ones removed, so our #1 humane solution is TNR.

Foster Care Network

When TNR is not an option, volunteers take the kitties into their own homes, spay/neuter, vaccinate and treat any illnesses. A foster home network provides an excellent environment to socialize kittens. It eliminates traditional shelter stressors, keeps disease from spreading, and caters to individual special needs. FCR houses 50 to 70 cats/kittens on average.

Adoption Program

It is the goal of FCR to match available kitties with suitable homes. Socialization toward humans is not a determining factor of adoptability. All living cats are adoptable into the appropriate situation. Our available kitties are spayed or neutered before adoption, with no exceptions. All have been treated for round worms and ear mites, vaccinated against Panleukopenia, and treated for any known illnesses. We require a signed adoption agreement, and request an adoption donation, but never deny a good home based on money.
